# Christopher McNamara: Vivid Against the Little, Soft Cities

Through dioramas, photography, and video, Christopher McNamara envisions human environments that distill personal memory, family lore, and popular culture. His settings range from mid-century suburbs to blighted downtowns and rustic railways. These document social aspiration and economic realities, and provide places for the imagination, where we can project our own stories.

Christopher McNamara is an award-winning artist who creates single channel digital works, sound and video installations, and performances. He has exhibited across Canada and in the United States, United Kingdom, Germany, Netherlands, and Switzerland. He has performed at international festivals including Mutek (Montreal), Spark (Minneapolis) and Detroit Electronic Music Festival (Detroit).

# Kick Back, Cool Down, Drink Up: Cigar Boxes, Fans, and Silverware from the Collection

Museum London's collection of cigar boxes, fans, and silverware embody important parts of the community's history. Cigar boxes, with their colourful images, illustrate a part of London's industrial past. Fans for their part, are fashion accessories, souvenirs, and, on occasion, promotional items. As for silverware, it was sometimes a gift to mark a milestone, and other times a status symbol, but always decorative.

# Camille Turner and Camal Pirbhai: The New Brunswick 5

October 26, 2023 to June 9, 2024

Front Entrance, Main Level

The New Brunswick 5 memorializes a 1786 wanted ad issued by Caleb Jones in the place known today as Fredericton, New Brunswick. The ad calls for the recapture of Isaac, Ben, Nancy, Flora, and Lidge, whom the slave-owner, Jones, claimed as his property. Appropriating the look of fashion photography, artists Camille Turner and Camal Pirbhai reimagine the freedom seekers as part of the contemporary world, setting off on their journey to freedom. This work was acquired for our collection in 2022 and this is the first time it has been exhibited at Museum London

Camille Turner and Camal Pirbhai have been working collaboratively since 2012. Their photo-based projects often explore hidden histories, Canadian identity, and Afrofuturism. In 2022, the Jamaican-born, Los Angeles-based Turner received the Artist Prize at the Toronto Biennial of Art. Pirbhai, a textile artist, is lead designer and principal of Studio la Beauté in Toronto.

#### **MEDIAH: SPECTRAL VANE**

June 10, 2023 to March 3, 2024

Atrium, Main Level

MEDIAH is Evond Blake, a Toronto-born artist based in London, Ontario. Through paintings, prints, murals, animation, and virtual reality experiences, MEDIAH has established an aesthetic of bold colours and planar forms that impart a sense of constant transformation and speed.

MEDIAH's practice blurs the line between "post graffiti"—a term coined in the early 1980s to describe the migration of graffiti from the street to institutions—and the dynamics of contemporary abstraction. The artist has participated in festivals, biennials, and exhibitions including 2023's NFTSE (Valencia, Spain), the GFA Biennial (Sao Paulo, Brazil), Art Basel CBS Mural Collaboration (Miami, USA), the City of Gold Festival (Johannesburg, South Africa), 2015's Pan Am Games, and Toronto's Nuit Blanche (2011, 2018).

# **Getting Around London**

**Until April 21, 2024** 

Community Gallery, Second Level

Explore how people once navigated the city through this exhibition of historic images from the mid-19th to the mid-20th centuries. It begins by highlighting the Deshkan Zibii / Thames River and shows how horses, bicycles, automobiles, trains, and airplanes connected citizens of London to each other and to the world. Getting Around London also asks you to consider the future, something that our current climate emergency makes particularly urgent.

#### Out of the Vault


